

# A note from Ms. Rogers,





Dear Parent/Guardian,

The purpose of this letter is to inform you that your student will take the computer-based Grade 4 and 5 Benchmarks for Excellent Student Thinking (B.E.S.T.) Writing assessment on April 2, 2025. The B.E.S.T. Writing assessment is administered in one 120-minute session, and students may work up to half of a typical school day. Your school will provide information about how to access the test results.

Thank you for supporting your student and encouraging him or her to do his or her best during this test administration. Please review the following policies with your student before testing:

Electronic Devices—Students are not permitted to have any electronic devices, including, but not limited to, cell phones, smartphones, smart glasses, and smartwatches, at any time during testing or during breaks (e.g., restroom), even if the devices are turned off or students do not use them. If your student is found with an electronic device or is found using Bluetooth/wireless headphones/earbuds during testing, his or her test will be invalidated.

Testing Rules Acknowledgment—All tests include a Testing Rules Acknowledgment that reads: "I understand the testing rules that were just read to me. If I do not follow these rules, my test score may be invalidated." Prior to testing, test administrators read the rules to students, and students acknowledge that they understand the testing rules by clicking a checkbox beside the statement in the secure browser indicating they understand the testing rules.

Discussing Test Content after Testing—The last portion of the testing rules read to students before they click the box to accept the Testing Rules Acknowledgment states that because the content of all statewide assessments is secure, students may not discuss or reveal details about the test content (including the passages, prompts, and writing responses) after the test. This includes any type of electronic communication, such as texting, emailing, or posting to social media sites. Please make sure your student understands this policy prior to testing and remind them that "discussing" test content includes any kind of electronic communication, such as texting, emailing, posting to social media, or sharing online. While students may not share information about secure test content after testing, this policy is not intended to prevent students from discussing their testing experiences with their parents/families.

Working Independently—Students are responsible for doing their own work during the test and for protecting their answers from being seen by others. If students are caught cheating during testing, their tests will be invalidated.

Leaving Campus—If your student leaves campus before completing a test session (e.g., for lunch, an appointment), he or she will not be allowed to return to that test session. If your student does not feel well on the day of testing, it may be best for him or her to wait and be tested on a make-up day. Please remember not to schedule appointments on testing days.

Testing Accommodations—If your student has an Individual Education Plan (IEP), a Section 504 Plan, or is an English Language Learner (ELL) or a recently exited ELL, please contact the school to discuss the testing accommodations that will be provided for your student.

Please note, in the event a testing irregularity occurs in your student's testing room, as part of a school investigation, your student may be asked questions to provide clarification of the incident.

ACCESS Testing- Testing will be completed this month for our K-5 ELL students. Individual student reports will be sent home in the Fall.



Parent Conferences- It is important that you know how your child is doing academically. Teachers are scheduling second parent conferences. If you haven't had a conference, please contact your child's teacher.

Supporting learning in the language opposite of your home language: This can be extremely challenging if your child is the only bilingual family member. The truth is, language development takes hard work in the classroom, too! Students are engaged in language production with scaffolds and support provided by the teacher, and with plenty of talk time and opportunities to interact with others using those supports. Confidence is built through these supports, and thus language eventually flows. Things you can do at home to help your child Engage in language fun! Watch favorite movies in the target language, listen to audiobooks, or create family flashcards where everyone is practicing vocabulary and learning the target language. Find ways to infuse language learning in your home or daily routine so that language exposure is not just provided by the teacher. While these extra steps do take time, they are worth the effort to instill a positive attitude and mindset around language learning.



We look forward to seeing all of you at our Dual Language Showcase March 20th, 2025 starting promptly at 8:30am.


Istation Parent Portal - Do you know what tier your child is on? If not, there are two easy ways to find out! First, ask your child's Spanish teacher or as a parent of a student in the Dual Language program, you have access to the online Istation Parent Portal!

#### To begin, go to

https://www.istation.com/istationhome . The first time you log in, you will be prompted to select your student's school. Type in the school information. (This will only be done once.) Then, type in your student's login information as provided by your teacher and click Log In. This Login is different from the school district login. If you need help or have any questions, please do not hesitate to ask your child's Spanish teacher or Ms. Concepcion at maibelis.concepcion@palmbeachschools.org.

## Kindergarten:

We are certainly marching on this trimester! Time surely flies when we are learning and having fun! Many exciting things are going on this month as well as many great learning opportunities. In reading, your kindergartener uses many different strategies! The students have been working very hard to decode text and comprehend what they are reading. They are also learning to re-read the text until it sounds nice and smooth. It is essential to support your child in reading at home and read to them daily or have them read to you. After reading, ask your child about the characters in their book. Discuss with them what the character did (their actions) throughout the book and how this made the character feel. Ask your child to use the pictures or specific parts of the text to support what they tell you about their characters. In math, students are practicing counting and recognizing numbers up to 100. Also, we are working on multiple strategies to add & subtract, problem-solve, and increase fact fluency within 20! We appreciate the extra help you are giving your child on basic math facts.



First Grade Families...Can you believe it is March already!! It's great to see the amount of growth your child has made. Thank you for all the efforts you have put in at home to help your child here at school! Here are some helpful hints to support your child at home: read or listen to books (fiction and nonfiction), help your child review telling time (o'clock and half past) and the value of coins (penny, nickel, dime, quarter), talk about the past/present/future, and discuss natural resources. A few reminders: check your child's folder every night, ask them how their day was, and encourage them to find a cozy spot and read for at least 20 minutes every day! Look on your child's portal and check their SIS cube...you will find their grades, progress reports, and report cards. Continue to go on Benchmark to increase reading skills and Reflex Math to increase fact fluency! Our focus this month is women in history. At home, discuss women in history...who they are and why they are important. Let's keep up the good work! Hope everyone has a safe and healthy spring break! We all deserve it!

## Second Grade:

Happy March from Second Grade! We are feeling lucky and ready for spring! In math we are learning different strategies on how to add and subtract with 3 digit numbers. In reading we have been investigating the past and learning about how the past has shaped our future. You can really learn a lot from the past! Please remember to check your child's blue communication folder each night to keep with important information and dates!



#### Hello 3rd-Grade Families!

Spring Break is almost here! Until then, our students will continue to work hard to meet their 3rd-grade goals. This month for reading, we'll continue Unit 6, "Making Decisions," and begin Unit 7, "Communities Then and Now." We will explore various communities from the past and present, focusing on their similarities.

In Math, students will cover data collection, representation, and interpretation in Unit 13, followed by time and measurement (both customary and metric) in Unit 14. March is Women's History Month, and we'll highlight influential women from the past and present who have shaped our world. Please check your child's agendas and communication folders daily. Thank you for your support, and enjoy a safe and restful Spring Break!

Hello fabulous 4th grade parents!
