Then read the additional related texts linked below and answer the questions that follow. Using Times New Roman (12 point double-spaced) font, save all of your responses as a Google Doc and be ready to share and discuss during the first week of school.

Question 1: Identify a theme addressed in the story and explain the significance of the theme throughout the story. Please make sure to answer the question fully and use textual evidence to support your thinking.

Question 2: What is the role of the main character and how does the main character contribute to the theme you identified in question one? Please make sure to answer the question fully and use textual evidence to support your thinking.

Question 3: What unique language features (figurative language, word choice, tone etc.) does the author use? Explain how these language features contribute to the text.

Now that you have read "The Masque of the Red Death," please read the next two attachments and complete the comparison questions that follow.

<u>"Do Not Go Gently Into That Good Night"</u>- Compare and contrast the ways Edgar Allan Poe and Dylan Thomas explore the themes of mortality in their works.
