Students and parents, as a reminder, South Intensive Transition School does have a dress code that students are expected to adhere to. Every student was informed of the dress code policy when they registered for school.

Students who do not follow the school's dress code policy will be subjected to consequences outlined in the district's student & family handbook. Our dress code is as follows:

TOPS

Any <u>solid colored shirt</u> or school spirit shirt may be worn. Shirts must be free from tears, rips, or holes, must not expose a student's naval section, and must be free of any writing. NO HOODIES.

BOTTOMS

Shorts, skirts or skorts, must be at least knee-length and worn at the natural waistline. NO SAGGY PANTS/SHORTS. Jeans and jean shorts, must be <u>free</u> <u>from tears, rips, or holes.</u> Leggings, yoga pants, and Spandex bottoms are not permitted to wear during school hours.

SHOES

Shoes must be closed-toe shoes with a back. Sneakers and dress shoes are permitted. Crocs with the heel strap, high heels, slides, and bedroom slippers are NOT permitted.

Palm Beach County School District requires all students to have wear their School ID badges while on school campus and on school transportation.

Parents & Guardians

The School District of Palm Beach County is excited to announce the opportunity for grade 8 students in district-operated schools to participate in the administration of the Preliminary SAT (PSAT) 8 at no cost.

Results from the PSAT 8 test will provide a baseline indicator of current progress toward college readiness and, because the college readiness benchmarks are closely aligned to the Florida state standards, the results can also be used to support grade level instruction and learning.

Student assessment data from the PSAT 8 can also be used to help high school counselors determine academic readiness and potential for success in Advanced Placement and other college preparatory courses, and to identify students who may need additional instruction before enrolling in such courses. The test will take place between October 16 and 31.

Students who participate will have the option to have scores sent to the Khan Academy, a free online resource, where an individual, customized study plan and practice will be designed for your student based on his or her results. However, if you do not wish to allow your student to participate in the PSAT 8, you must sign and submit the attached waiver to your child's school.

We encourage all 8th grade students to take this opportunity that is available to them for the following reasons:

- The PSAT 8 includes grade level appropriate mathematics, reading, writing and language components; there is no special preparation needed.
- •The program can help identify each student's potential for academic success during and after high school.
- •The PSAT 8 is closely aligned to the PSAT/National Merit Qualifying Test and the SAT which students will take in 9th and 10th grades, and the results can be used to prepare for improved future performance on those assessments.
- •Test results will provide high school guidance counselors with information to help guide students who may be ready to enroll and be successful in Advanced Placement and other college preparatory courses as early as 9th grade, or identify areas where students may need additional instruction prior to enrollment in college preparatory courses.
- •Test results can open up discussion about future education plans that may not have been considered otherwise.

WHAT IS 988?

988 is the new nationwide three-digit number now available for suicide and mental health crisis, available to everyone in the U.S.

This easy-to-remember number will route callers to the 988 Suicide and Crisis Lifeline network, where compassionate, accessible care and support are available for anyone experiencing a mental health-related emergency – whether that is thoughts of suicide, a mental health or substance use crisis or any other kind of emotional distress. People can also dial 988 if they are worried about a loved one who may need crisis support.

What to expect when you contact 988

The goal of the 988 Lifeline is to provide free, 24/7, confidential, immediate crisis intervention and support. Here's how it works:



If you call 988, you'll hear a message that you've reached the Lifeline. If you are a veteran, you can press "1" to reach the Veterans' Crisis Line or "2" to reach Spanish-speaking crisis counselors for the Lifeline.



If you don't select either option, or if you text or chat, a trained crisis counselor will answer. (For texters, you will be prompted to text 838255 if you want to reach the Veterans' Crisis Line.)



Spanish crisis services are available for callers to 988, and translation services are available in more than 150 additional languages. TTY is available for deaf or hard-of-hearing callers by dialing 711 then 1-800-273-8255.



The counselor will engage you to understand how your or loved one is impacted and what help you might need.

While the NAMI Helpline allows you to speak with a peer who can connect you to NAMI resources, it is **not a hotline, crisis line, or a suicide prevention line.** It is available M-F from 10 A.M. to 10 P.M. ET.
